

The Charlotte W. Newcombe Foundation announces grants for the 2014-15 academic year

Princeton, NJ – The Trustees of The Charlotte W. Newcombe Foundation have approved forty-two grants for 2014-15, awarding \$2,338,661 for scholarships and fellowships.

Grants totaling \$1,558,833 are designated for student scholarships at forty-one colleges and universities. Within this total, \$592,833 will be in the form of matching challenge grants to build Newcombe-endowed scholarship funds at thirty-nine institutions. Additionally, the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation will receive \$779,628 to continue administration of the Charlotte W. Newcombe Doctoral Dissertation Fellowships program through 2014-15.

The 2014-15 awards bring the Newcombe Foundation's cumulative grant awards since 1981 to \$60.9 million. Based upon thirty-three years of institutional reports to the Foundation, over 37,000 Newcombe Scholarship awards have assisted students at ninety-nine colleges and universities. Also since 1981, 1,172 Charlotte W. Newcombe Doctoral Dissertation Fellowships have been funded through annual grants to the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation. At last report, ninety-seven Newcombe-endowed scholarship funds at sixty universities and colleges had a combined market value of \$19.2 million; these funds generated \$721,000 toward Newcombe Scholarships in 2013-14.

Newcombe Scholarships for Mature Women Students

The Trustees of The Charlotte W. Newcombe Foundation have awarded grants for 2014-15 totaling \$1,160,333 to thirty-one universities and colleges (listed below) in the Foundation's Newcombe Scholarships for Mature Women Students program. The Newcombe Foundation works in partnership with each funded institution to encourage degree completion among mature women students who have financial need, limited resources, and, often, family and work responsibilities. The Foundation recognizes, values, and encourages the development of programs, special initiatives, and organizational structures that welcome and support mature women students as they navigate the process of earning a degree.

Note: The Foundation now permits but does not require recipient institutions to extend Newcombe Scholarships to mature men students who meet the same eligibility standards that are applied to women students in the Newcombe Foundation policy. Institutions that opt to do so many choose to call the program at their institutions "Newcombe Scholarships for Mature Students" or "Newcombe Scholarships for Mature Women and Men."

All thirty-one funded institutions have received prior funding from the Foundation. For the sixteen institutions that have been funded since the program's inception in 1981, this will be the thirty-fourth year of Newcombe Foundation support.

Most of the universities and colleges that were funded during 2013-14 added funds from other sources to the financial awards received by Newcombe Scholars during the academic year, and all thirty-one institutions funded in 2014-15 have committed to a full or partial match.

Within the grants for 2014-15, \$720,500 will fund student scholarships for use during 2014-15 and \$439,833 will fund challenge grants to build existing Newcombe-endowed scholarship funds at thirty institutions. The latest reported combined market value of Newcombe-endowed scholarship funds at thirty institutions that have been funded through the Mature Women Students program is \$8.1 million; these funds provided \$249,000 in

endowment income toward 2013-14 Newcombe Scholarships.

The thirty-one new grants bring the Foundation's cumulative funding for Newcombe Scholarships for Mature Women Students to \$20.3 million since 1981.

Newcombe Scholarships for Students with Disabilities

The Trustees of The Charlotte W. Newcombe Foundation have awarded grants for 2014-15 totaling \$348,500 to eight universities and colleges (listed below) in its program of Newcombe Scholarships for Students with Disabilities. The Newcombe Foundation provides these scholarships through partnerships with selected colleges and universities that welcome enrollment by students with disabilities and are committed to their success. Each of the currently funded institutions has received grants continuously in this program for many years.

Within the grants for 2014-15, \$245,500 will fund student scholarships to be awarded during 2014-15 and \$103,000 will fund challenge grants to build existing Newcombe-endowed scholarship funds at seven institutions. The latest reported combined market value of Newcombe-endowed funds at nine institutions that have been funded through the Students with Disabilities program is over \$3.1 million; these Funds provided \$142,000 in endowment income toward 2013-14 Newcombe Scholarships.

The eight new grants bring the Foundation's cumulative funding for Newcombe Scholarships for Students With Disabilities to \$9.32 million since 1981.

Special Scholarship Endowment Grants

Through Special Scholarship Endowment Grants, the Foundation strives to help selected colleges and universities build Newcombe-endowed scholarship funds that support completion of bachelor's degrees by students needing financial assistance from within an identified group at each funded institution.

Davis & Elkins College (WV) is in its final year as a recipient of a four-year grant while the University of Pikeville (KY) will receive the first installment of a multi-year grant in this program. The total to be awarded in 2014-15 is \$50,000.

Charlotte W. Newcombe Doctoral Dissertation Fellowships

The Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation of Princeton, New Jersey has received a grant of \$779,828 to continue administration of the Charlotte W. Newcombe Doctoral Dissertation Fellowships program in 2014-15. The grant will furnish \$25,000 stipends to twenty-two nationally selected scholars in the humanities and social sciences whose dissertations constitute original and serious study of ethical or religious values. It will also underwrite WWNFF's administration of the program, including costs for rigorous academic evaluation of nearly six hundred applications for the Fellowship. In the thirty-four years since the program's inception in 1981, the Newcombe Foundation has awarded \$22 million for the program of Charlotte W. Newcombe Doctoral Dissertation Fellowships. In total, 1,172 promising scholars have been named Newcombe Fellows.
